Year 4 have also thoroughly enjoyed exploring our culture box and learning all about Sri Lanka! We have been greeting each other in many different languages this week in celebration of European Day of Languages and 4F mapped lots of different words to say 'hello' on a world map. In our Brazil topic, we have begun to learn about what rainforests are. We have talked about the huge variety of animals and plants that live there and about the different layers as well as about the most famous one of all: The Amazon!





Year 5 - The children have been learning all about the Aztecs. The have found the rituals particularly interesting and have begun to explore some of the gods that the Aztecs worshipped. There has been some very interesting discussion work and the children have shown real maturity in their approach to the topic work.



Year 6 - This week the majority of year 6 pupils went to PGL, however a group of 16 pupils remained at school for an exciting week, learning all about World War 2. Some of the children shared their highlights of the week:
