Look what we've been up to...

Reception: This week was our first full week in reception! The children have been making lots of friends and have enjoyed exploring their outdoor area. They made some yummy mud cakes in the mud kitchen and tried to feed them to the teachers! The children are becoming used to the classroom routines and can now put their coats, book bags, water bottles etc away independently!



Year 1: This week Year 1 have continued adjusting to their new curriculum. They are loving their Science and 'Picture This!' topic work. This week we found out about different species of animals such as mammals, fish, reptiles and amphibians and all the differences between them. We have also been learning more about the local area in which we live and how that compares and fits into to the wider world. The children have been so excited by exploring Google maps!

Year 2 have really enjoyed learning the song for "The European Day of Languages" on Monday. The children have challenged themselves to learn as many different ways as they can to say "hello" in different languages. We look forward to signing with the rest of the school on Monday.

Over the week, Year 3 have been designing and making tortoises! These will form part of a display dedicated to the book Esio Trot that the children have been learning about this week. In literacy the children have been writing a recount of this story using interesting vocabulary and different sentence openers. The children have also begun their Picture This topic on

the Stone Age! They have imagined what it would have been like to have lived in this period. They really enjoyed comparing and contrasting the diet of Stone Age people to their own!





Year 4: This week we started our new literacy unit 'Stories From Other Cultures'. We have started to read 'Gregory Cool' which is a story of a young boy who travels to Tobago to stay with his gradparents. The children have been looking at how Gregory adjusts to the strange cultures, and learns to enjoy the lifestyle of the Caribbean.

4N continued their swimming lessons on Monday. In addition, 30 children have been selected for additional 'booster' lessons, which will take place every Friday. These lessons are aimed at non-swimmers / children who cannot swim 25 meters unaided. We hope this will provide a wonderful opportunity to get more of our children to reach the 25 meter target by the end of the year. Good luck Year 4!



Year 5 threw themselves enthusiastically into research projects this week. The children have been learning about global environmental issues and this week began looking at endangered animals. It was excellent to see them developing their communication and collaboration skills as part of their team challenge, as well as learning all about the reasons why some animals become extinct.
