


Look what we've been up to:

Nursery - The children have quickly settled back into nursery and have been sharing their holiday news. We have introduced our new topic "Once upon a time" and the children have been keen to explore our castle role-play area.



Reception - This week, during our challenges, some of the children were writing about their favourite Christmas present. Some of us took a big challenge and we were ordering numbers from one to twenty and everyone was learning to add one more to a given number. We practised writing a number sentence using the addition and equal symbols.



Year 1 - The photograph shows the mysterious egg that appeared in the year 1 classrooms this week. Year 1 were so intrigued about how it could have got here and so excited about what it could be! Some children even thought they heard cracking noises... The children did some wonderful writing about their predictions of what they thought it was and described what they thought might be inside. Eventually it hatched and out came a dinosaur!!! This launched our topic of dinosaurs which we are going to be learning about this half term.

We have also been looking at the fables written by Aesop many, many years ago and how the morals taught are still relevant today. We are looking forward to writing our own over the coming weeks. The Year 2 teachers were thrilled to see many children returning to school with so many reading diary entries over the holiday period and hearing about all the fantastic books they have been reading well done Year 2!

Year 3 - It has been an exciting start to 2017 in Year 3. The children have shown lots of enthusiasm for their new topic on
